Some Spokies attended the first Vélorution 'movement' in Paris, at the beginning of July. Over 2,000 cyclists from France, Spain, Italy and the UK converged on Paris for a three day celebration of cycling. One of the highlights of the weekend was the 4 hour critical mass ride which started at the Hotel de Ville and ended at the Eiffel Tower where a spontaneous party took place. The Vélorution 'movement' first began in Rome, Italy, in 2005. It is rumoured that The Vélorution movement will be coming to London in September 2011.

SPOKES was formed in 1994 to campaign for better cycling facilities in East Kent. SPOKES works closely with SUSTRANS, Kent County Council, district and parish councils. SPOKES is affiliated to the Cyclists' Touring Club, the Cycle Campaign Network and Euro-Regio

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The Viking Bike Ride follows the Viking Coastal Trail between Ramsgate, Broadstairs, Margate and Reculver. If you are doing the longer route it continues along the Oyster Bay Trail towards Swalecliffe and Whitstable where it joins up with the Crab & Winkle Way towards Canterbury. Start from the Viking Ship, Joss Bay, Reculver or Canterbury. Registration 9am, departure at 9.30am. The entry fee—£10 for adults before the day £10 or £15 on the day; £5 for children under 16—includes a free t-shirt. The fee purely goes towards the cost of running the event safely. The SPOKES stand and three committee members attended the KCC "Cycle Kent 2010" day on June 18th. The purpose of the day was to "showcase cycling to key national and local decision makers", particularly to KCC members and councillors from around Kent, through a number of presentations, display stands and a cycle ride from Shorne Woods to the A2 Activity Park in Kent Thameside. KCC officers did a very good job in organising the day. The event included presentations from Malcolm Shepherd (Sustrans), Professor Yvonne Doyle (Regional Director Public Health) on the health benefits of cycling and the inspirational Rachel Morris (paralympic hand-cyclist at Beijing 2008). The SPOKES stand generated a lot of interest and the day provided a good opportunity meet and share with others working on cycling development across the county and nationally. While the general theme of the event was that cycle facilities offer a low cost way of tackling health issues, road congestion and climate change the big question is will the message get through to the decision makers in these financially difficult times? We have since heard of a 66% cut in the KCC budget for cycle related projects, Cycling England with its Bikeability scheme are facing the axe, and there is the ongoing motorised transport mindset.

Cycling between Canterbury and Dover

Balfour Beatty Mott MacDonald (BBMM), working on behalf of the Highways Agency (HA), are 'reviewing current cycle facilities along the A2 between Canterbury and Dover'.

In particular they want comments on:

- ◆ Discontinuity of routes
- ◆ Problems where existing cycle routes join or cross the Highways Agency network
- ◆ Suppressed demand due to lack of appropriate facilities
- ◆ Poor or inconsistent signage of routes

Here is a golden opportunity for us to say to the people who design and build roads what we as cyclists need. As far as I can see any indication of cycle provision on the A2 stops at the Dover end of the Canterbury bypass. Around Canterbury, after the bypass was built, overnight works put in place cycle crossings of the slip roads at Harbledown, Wincheap and Bridge. Most of these direct cyclists into the metre strip (between the white rumble strip and the grass or pebble verge) where there

are diagrams of cycles reinforcing the idea that this is a lane for cycles. I still wonder why there are pictures of a cycle in the metre strip around Canterbury if cyclists are not supposed to be there; and whether cyclists are expected to survive the length of the Bridge bypass, so maybe they will not need a slip road crossing at the far end!

Canterbury to Chartham riverside route

This cycling and walking route now extends from Toddler's Cove in Canterbury through to Tonford Lane. Construction is continuing beyond here and is currently approaching the A28 bridge. Bridge supports are being constructed to cross over the river from Staples, and to span two smaller ditches. It looks like the bridge from Staples may be installed very soon. The path has also been built out around the former Elham Valley Railway Line embankment, enabling a straight route to be taken. It's expected that the full route will be completed by this autumn. Oyster Bay Trail

New promenade byelaw for cycling in the Herne Bay and Whitstable areas

The new promenade byelaw for cycling in the Herne Bay and Whitstable areas has been confirmed and came into operation on 14 July 2010, one calendar month after the date of confirmation. This means that cycling is now permitted on certain sections of promenade in Herne Bay and Whitstable.

The sections of promenade where cycling is still prohibited are:

- i) Along Herne Bay sea front between Hampton Pier and where Cooper's Hill meets Central Parade;
- ii) West of Longrock, Swalecliffe.

We intend to complete the identified safety and signage works between Beltinge and Swalecliffe by October 2010. This will result in the completion of the first 6.5 mile phase of the Oyster Bay Trail which forms part of Regional Cycle Route 15, linking up with the Viking Coastal Trail. Phase 1 of the Oyster Bay Trail is comprised of approximately 5 miles of promenades, new traffic-free cycle paths (around Bishopstone Glen and through Reculver Country Park) and lightly trafficked residential roads. A further 1.5 miles is signed along the traffic calmed Western Esplanade and Central Parade in Herne Bay which will also benefit from the introduction of a new 20 mph zone. We intend to publish a leaflet which will help to promote phase 1 of the route.

The next 4-mile section of the Oyster Bay Trail will be between Swalecliffe and Whitstable (linking up with the Crab & Winkle Way) and we will start to investigate route options during 2010. We will of course undertake public consultation so that local people can have their say before Canterbury City Council Members make the final decision on the route. We then hope to formalise the issue of cycling along Tankerton seafront one way or the other.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Spokes' members for your continuing support. We will keep you informed as to when the public consultation for phase 2 will take place so that you can give your views.

We would like to respectfully remind cyclists that cycling is not permitted through the heart of Bishopstone Glen. Letter Writing Request to 'Build Bridges' on the Crab and Winkle Cycle Route

Plans for the Bridges on the C&W at Whitstable have now been submitted to Canterbury City Council and letters are needed to help 'build bridges'. This new Greenway from All Saints Close to the seafront will double the length of the existing Invicta Way. It will be step-free, traffic-free and encourage a 'modal shift' - (jargon for 'getting on yer bike' and using legs. It therefore offers the opportunity to reduce congestion and improve individual and environmental health.

The Crab & Winkle Line Trust (applicant) is extremely grateful to Sustains (agent) and CCC and KCC for all their support so far. The preparatory work has involved a complete redesign and considerable local consultation. Ecological studies have been carried out as part of the preparation, including surveys of bats, reptiles and trees. Regional Director for Sustrans, Simon Pratt, said, "This new route will be of great benefit to residents of Whitstable allowing people to walk and cycle safely right through to the seafront. The new path will also encourage visitors to the area". Simon said, "It will be necessary to remove some trees and shrubs as

part of the bridge construction work. But many hundreds of new trees will be planted. Independent advice is that this planting will dramatically improve and widen the diversity of plant species and the value of the corridor as a wildlife habitat"

The scheme is being part funded by Sustrans via a grant from the Big Lottery Fund and is also being funded by Kent County Council. The route is part of Sustrans Connect2 scheme, which is developing walking and cycling routes across the UK.

It can appear that letter-writing is only concerned with objecting, but we hope this will not apply here! Please write a positive letter supporting this planning application. This route is about the future and therefore children and young people are likely to benefit most, so please encourage youngsters to write as well.
